



The Monthly Report on the General Situation in the Republic of Yemen



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POLITICAL PREFACE

1. The beloved Yemeni people are being subjected to an unjust, immoral and illegal war by countries that have long been calling outwardly for defending human rights, especially the US, UK and their instruments in the region, namely Saudi Arabia and the UAE. It is a war that has claimed everything beautiful in Yemen, especially the vulnerable groups (children, women, and the elderly), according to dozens of impartial reports of the UN and International Human Rights Organizations.
2. It is a very painful truth, but what is even more distressing is that the International Institution, i.e. the UN, is participating in this war, despite the fact that its main concern, according to Chapter VII of the UN Charter, is to stop foreign attacks on countries by force. This is what should have been undertaken by this Organization, towards the grievances of the undeterred Yemeni people who strongly defend their ideals – the highest global ideals of freedom, independence and sovereignty, according to the UN Charter. However, unfortunately the disappointment of all Yemeni people is growing as they realize the weakness, complicity, and even identification of the UN with the murderers of their children, despite the reports of UN agencies, organizations and commissions which accuse the War Coalition countries of committing grave crimes and violations against Yemeni children, foremost among them is the reports of the UN Group of Eminent International and Regional Experts on Yemen. Instead of mobilizing the world to condemn this war and working to stop violations, the UN boldly and brazenly seeks to justify and conceal the shame inflicted by the War Coalition countries, which have been repeatedly and systematically targeting thousands of children, as it was clearly expressed in the statement of the former UN Secretary-General, Ban Ki-moon. Today, it is the same logic that stands in effect, as telling the truth against these countries will cause the UN to lose a lot of financial supports upon which the organization survives. Accordingly, they would rather opt for dollars to cover the blood of children and hide the shame of their murderers.
3. Such attitudes increase the Yemeni people's awareness of the truth and the hidden agenda behind the work of this international institution. The instruments of acquittal purchased from the UN cannot erase the shame of the Yemeni children's killers. Rather, such attitudes will put this international institution in the popular list of shame, which is reinforced by irrefutable evidence and the blood of thousands of innocent children.

ECONOMIC SITUATION

4. The salary interruption crisis in Yemen has been one of the most distressing issues that trouble the Yemeni people, especially as the countries of the War Coalition continue to use the economic situation as leverage in their economic and military war to pressure the National Salvation Government in Sana'a to accept their dictates. They are indifferent to the miserable condition of Yemen, in which the humanitarian situation has been described internationally as the worst humanitarian disaster in the world. Consequently, the Yemenis have been suffering severely as they are deprived of the most basic necessities of life, and this has added to their heavy burdens of life, according to dozens of international reports.
5. Since the beginning of the war on Yemen about 5 years ago, the public sector employees, particularly in the education sector in the governorates under the rule of the National Salvation Government in Sana'a, have been suffering from interruptions of salaries, and the lack of operating budgets for educational institutions. This has caused irreparable damage to public schools and universities, and greatly affected the right to education, especially among children.
6. Since the transfer of the Central Bank from the Capital, Sana'a, to the governorate of Aden in August 2016, the Salary Issue has been subjected to international, regional and partisan political calculations by the War Coalition countries. Meanwhile, the conditions of public sector employees have been deteriorating to the worst and public institutions, whether in the northern or southern governorates, have also threatened to completely stop providing essential services, which results in paralyzing the daily life movements of citizens.

7. The countries of the War Coalition and their mercenaries have printed counterfeit banknotes in denomination of One Thousand Riyal, similar to those printed by consensus in 2017 (1438 AH), pumping large cash amounts of the new banknotes into the governorates under their control. The amount of money printed under the orders of the War Coalition countries and their mercenaries until this month of June has amounted to five trillion and 320 billion riyals, which is three times the cash issued by the Central Bank in Sana'a from 1964 to 2014.
8. The value of the exchange rate of the Yemeni Riyal against the US dollar has declined sharply in the governorates under the Saudi-UAE occupation, as a result of the useless monetary policy and the printing of new banknotes without an economic and legal cover. This has led to a sharp decline in the foreign exchange reserve in the Central Bank in Aden and its inability to meet the market's need of foreign currency. Consequently, the exchange rates of the Yemeni riyal, against foreign currencies in Aden, amounted to approximately 1,000 riyals for one US dollar, and this is reflected on the living conditions of citizens in those governorates. On the contrary, the Yemeni Riyal has considerably maintained a state of stability in the Capital Sana'a, as the dollar rate there has not exceeded the limits of 600 riyals against the US dollar.
9. The countries of the War Coalition continued to detain oil derivatives ships, preventing them from docking at Hodeidah port, and causing some of them to return back to their places of departure without unloading their cargo due to the long period of detention, despite obtaining the UNVIM pass permits. This has further exacerbated the humanitarian, health and service conditions, doubled the demurrage and detention charges, and caused price hikes as well as the collapse of basic services.

HUMANITARIAN SITUATION


10. The report of the UN Secretary-General, António Guterres, released on June 18, 2021, which included Ansar Allah in the black "List of Shame" of child rights abusers, incurred the discontent of many human rights organizations and activists in various countries of the world.
11. This report reflects the deliberate politicization of human rights agendas and their transformation from a UN international mechanism primarily concerned with safeguarding human dignity, protecting children and achieving justice in various parts of the world into a mechanism subject to the interests of major world Powers.
12. Such a report embodies the policy of double standards in the resolutions and reports of the United Nations in dealing with the humanitarian file in Yemen. It started with the horrific silence regarding the massacres committed by the War Coalition countries in Yemen, then followed by the failure to blacklist the countries of the Saudi-led War Coalition against Yemen in the "The List of Shame" for violating the Yemeni children's rights for more than six years, resulting in thousands of dead and wounded children and women which amounted to (13,173), including (7,956) children, and finally ended with releasing this unjust report with a view to falsifying and misrepresenting facts, in favor of their own interests. Unfortunately, this report was issued despite the availability of ample UN-verified evidence of the War Coalition's responsibility for grave violations and

- the most heinous crimes committed by them against the Yemeni children and everything related to them such as schools, hospitals, care centers, gardens and parks.
13. The United Nations shows double standards in classifying the parties to conflict in Yemen regarding the violation of the rights of Yemeni children through the declarations of some UN officials about the practice of the countries of the Saudi-led Coalition of Aggression. The War Coalition countries put great pressure and threats to cut financial contributions to the UN, if they were not removed from the list of Child rights violators (The List of Shame), and accordingly, the United Nations acquiesced to those threats.
 14. The United Nations has ignored the situation of Yemeni children in the occupied governorates in southern and eastern Yemen, where they have reached the point of being thrown into wars outside Yemen as mercenaries in such countries as Libya.
 15. The UN reports are not based upon facts on the ground, as they simply deal with a small part of a comprehensive aggression against Yemen. These reports have restricted the children victims to the military strikes only and completely ignored the children victims who die due to the repercussions of the siege imposed on Yemen.
 16. The deteriorated situation of the Yemeni children in general is not only due to the military operations and the aerial bombardment by the Aggression forces, but also the victims of the siege imposed on Yemen have repercussions on children exponentially compared to the victims of military operations, especially the air strikes launched by the forces of the Coalition of Aggression against Yemen.
 17. The reports issued by the United Nations bodies and organizations contradict themselves, as the majority of them emphasize on the deterioration of the humanitarian situation in Yemen and the arrival of the situation in Yemen to what they describe as the worst humanitarian situation in the world, holding the countries of the Saudi and Emirati-led Coalition of Aggression more responsible for the tragic situation in Yemen. On the contrary, other reports completely overlooked the Saudi-Emirati role in the catastrophic situation of Yemeni children, such as the report of the UN Secretary-General on children and armed conflict, which discussed the violations of Yemeni children's rights.

CRIMES AND VIOLATIONS

18. In their direct bombing, the countries of War Coalition, led by the US, Saudi Arabia and the UAE, have committed violations and crimes against internationally protected civilian groups and objects, particularly civilians in their homes and places of gathering, such as markets and commercial centers. Besides, farms of various types of plantations and animals were targeted through direct indiscriminate attacks. In this month, a number of civilians were killed and others wounded, a number of homes and vital buildings were destroyed, many agricultural crops were burned down and damaged, and a number of livestock and poultry died.
19. The War Coalition countries continue through their armed groups in Hodeidah and its surroundings to clearly violate the Stockholm Agreement related to Hodeidah by intensifying the drones' flights and direct targeting of many vital facilities with air strikes, and shelling of homes with mortars and heavy weapons in the various districts of Hodeidah Governorate. Moreover, a number of military sites have been developed in many villages of Hodeidah governorate.








STORY OF THE MONTH

(The Assassination of Innocence: Three Little Girls Lost ...!)

The family of Abu Abdul Karim waited for the father to return home, especially his three daughters, Raja, Najwa and Yusra, who were waiting hopefully to get the gifts that their father had promised to give them. Each one was imagining what kind of gift she would receive. Suddenly, the doorbell of the house rang, and it was the father who was at the door, so they hurried to him. Each of them wanted to reach the door first in order to get the gift from her father before the others could get it. They were extremely happy at the return of their father and longing for the gifts. However, they were disappointed and their facial features changed from intense joy to extreme sadness, as they saw their Dad, Abu Abdul Karim, coming back empty-handed. The father, Abu Abdul Karim, entered the sitting room and sat with all his children and wife. He started playing with his three little daughters and son joyfully. The place seemed to buzz with laughter and joy as everyone enjoys playing that night. However, the three little girls are still obsessed with the awaited gifts, despite the enjoyable atmosphere of games and laughter that pervaded the house. Najwa could not bear it and yelled at her father, saying, "Dad, where are the gifts you promised us?" The father kept silent and then replied embarrassedly, "Oh, I forgot them in Uncle Abu Baraka's shop." The three little girls started crying. Then, the elder brother Abdul Karim intervened to reassure them, saying to them "I will go to get the gifts from the shop." Abdul Karim walked out of the house located in a residential neighborhood east of the Capital Sana'a. It was only a few minutes before he heard the sound of a massive explosion as a result of an air raid launched by the warplanes of the War Coalition countries. He traced the location of that explosion, and was shocked that the explosion targeted their own house. His face changed, and everything around him became dark. Abu Abdul Karim's house was not located next to any military facility or site, but rather it was among houses inhabited by helpless civilians. "I went home in a hurry, and there was a pile of rubble, the roof tumbled down, and dust and the smell of gunpowder filled the place," Abdul Karim explained painfully. "I could hear my sisters screaming from under the rubble. My neighbors and I tried to remove the rubble and rescue them, but we could not. We tried over and over again but in vain". While we and all our neighbors were trying to remove the rubble from above the heads of my sisters and father, there was a sound of a warplane hovering over our heads heavily, and all those who were trying to remove the rubble to rescue my sisters who were screaming for help, escaped fearing that a new air raid would affect them. A few minutes later, we heard the sound of a missile heading again towards the rubble of our house and making a heavy explosion that filled the place with dust; the rocks and the remnants of the missile shrapnel flew over a wide range. After the plane had left, I hurried to the place where my sisters' voice was coming from, but I could hear them no more. Their screams and cries for help were interrupted. My father and three little sisters died, and only my mother survived. I felt deeply grieved and at that moment I wished I had evaporated. Abdul Karim states that at that night their house was filled with happiness, and suddenly that happiness turned into grief and severe pain. "I felt the darkness and the great gloominess that replaced the light prevailing in our house then, as that night combines my sisters' innocence, laughter and crying for gifts. I've seen criminality and injustice in the ugliest form," Abdul Karim explains tearfully. "My life and my mother's life have become difficult in the absence of my father and little sisters; it was all over and done with. My mother has no longer any interest in life. As I visit my father and sisters' graves every day, I pray that the Almighty God will compensate them for this world of monsters with the Paradise of Eternity".

Abdul Karim has become incapable to provide the most basic needs such as food, medicine and house rent for him and his mother, especially since his salaries were interrupted three years ago, as the War Coalition countries had transferred the Central Bank from Sana'a, the Capital Secretariat, to Aden governorate. Fully frustrated, Abdul Karim talks "I live in a very severe condition, with no salary or work. Time seems to cease in my eyes." He kept repeating in low spirits, "I have become a dead person; the human conscience has been lost in this world."
